The government's evidence showed that during two years alone, Brown collected \$4.27 million from the schools: \$1.6 million in 2007-08 and \$2.67 million the next year." In addition, in 2005 Brown helped create the Agora Cyber Charter School in Devon, which provides online in-home instruction to students from across the state. According to Business Wire, “The indictment alleged that the defendants had engaged in a scheme to defraud two U.S. financial institutions, Deutsche Bank in New York City and CoBank in Denver, in connection with a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) loan guarantee program called the GSM-102 Program (the Program), in which the USDA guaranteed 98 percent of the principal value of loans made from U.S. financial institutions to certain foreign banks. 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- **The GSM-102 Program Was Available To Exporters Of Fresh Produce, Meats, Grains, Oilseeds, Rice, And Flour, Hides, And Other Products.** According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, “The GSM-102 program provides credit guarantees to encourage financing of commercial exports of U.S. agricultural products. By reducing financial risk to lenders, credit guarantees encourage exports to buyers in countries — mainly developing countries — that have sufficient financial strength to have foreign exchange available for scheduled payments. The program is available to exporters of: high-value, consumer-oriented, processed products such as frozen foods, fresh produce, meats, condiments, wine and beer; intermediate products such as hides, flour and paper products; and bulk products such as grains, oilseeds and rice.” [[U.S. Department of Agriculture, accessed 3/23/22](#)]

According to the Pennsylvania Capital Star, “McSwain, a former federal prosecutor, has done poorly in early polling. But last month, he secured a key and deep-pocketed endorsement from Commonwealth Partners Chamber of Entrepreneurs, a free-market advocacy group mostly funded by one donor. Political groups associated with Commonwealth Partners already have at least \$20 million in the bank. And the first round of spending — nearly \$7 million on pro-McSwain TV ads — went out the door this week through an associated group, the Commonwealth Leaders Fund.
